The OCR Level 3 Cambridge Advanced National Certificate in Health and Social Care is an Alternative Academic Qualification (AAQ) designed for students aged 16–19. It aims to develop the knowledge, understanding, and practical skills needed to support progression to university-level study, especially when studied alongside other relevant qualifications. The content is closely aligned with the health and social care sector. AAQs combine academic learning with practical, vocational experience. This course is ideal for students who are passionate about working within the NHS or related services, and who aspire to careers such as healthcare assistants, social workers, paramedics, physiotherapists, nurses, or clinical psychologists.

The Extended Certificate in Health and Social Care explores a wide range of essential topics, including equality, diversity and rights, health and safety, anatomy and physiology, person-centred approaches, mental health, long-term physiological conditions, public health strategies, sexual health, nutrition, and lifestyle choices. Through this course, you will gain the knowledge, understanding, and skills needed to support progression to undergraduate study.

You will explore how to communicate in health and social care, how to build relationships and the barriers that need to be overcome to achieve person-centred care. You will learn to write outline care plans to suit individuals, using person-centred approaches and develop your reflective practice skills.
