Students will work to meet specific briefs and deadlines demonstrating their ability to communicate ideas creatively and effectively. Year 13 concludes the two-year A Level Photography programme. The goal is to refine essential skills and knowledge to become independent and confident creatives who can effectively select and utilize a variety of photography materials, techniques, and digital tools and to develop a personal response to centre based and externally set themes set by the AQA exam board.

Through the study of influential photographers and analysis of their work, students will enhance their critical thinking and analytical skills. Students will work to meet specific briefs and deadlines demonstrating their ability to communicate ideas creatively and effectively. This will prepare students to achieve success, prepare them for further education and the workplace.
