Curriculum Overview

Subject: French

Year Group: 8



During this year, students will have the opportunity to talk about school, their subjects and what their future plans will be. Students will be able to revisit opinions, the present tense and talking about another person. The future tense will be a key tense throughout the year with some introduction to the past tense towards the end of the year. By the end of the year, students will be able to understand and to use the future tense accurately when talking about themselves and others.
